Beverly Hills paves the way for Pride Month

■ Rainbow crosswalks double as safety study

Pride Month festivities have already begun in West Hollywood and Los Angeles, with parades and countless concerts, comedy shows and drag brunches at clubs and restaurants. This year, the city of

Beverly Hills will celebrate Pride Month with rainbow lighting outside City Hall, a special performance at Beverly Cañon Gardens on June 6 and rainbow-painted crosswalks at two intersections.

■ Progress Pride flag flies over every county facility

The Pride flag now flies over every building operated by Los Angeles County. The Progress Pride flag became a point of contention in Downey in recent weeks, when its City Council voted to ban the flag, as well as any other kind of Pride flag, at Downey city buildings.

"The city of Downey has five council members and two of them are openly gay men [who voted in favor of the flag]," L.A. County Assessor Jeff Prang said. "How can [the other three council members] sit there on that dais and look at [their] colleagues who [they] work with day in and day out and cast a vote that could be harmful to them ... I don't know how human beings do that."

In response to the council's decision, L.A. County Supervisor Janice Hahn, 4th District, held a ceremony on June 3 raising the Progress Pride flag over the L.A. County Office of Education,

located in Downey.

"L.A. County has not one, not two, not three but eight county facilities [in Downey]," Hahn said, adding that the flag is now flying over every single one.

As opposed to the standard rainbow Pride flag, the Progress Pride flag is designed with additional pink, light blue, black and brown

stripes to represent BIPOC, nonbinary and transgender members of the LGBTQ+ community.

A large contingent of local officials attended the flag ceremony, including West Hollywood Mayor John Erickson.

"Here in Los Angeles, we still have places that would rather tell

Beverly Hills pumps up water supply

■ Rep. Ted Lieu secures federal funding grant for well project

Construction is underway for a Beverly Hills Public Works project that will create two new underground water wells in La Cienega Park. The wells, known as the LeDoux and Gregory wells, will increase potable water supply in the

city by up to 900 acre feet - nearly 300 million gallons – per year.

The wells will pump water from the Central Basin - a massive series of natural aquifers found deep underneath Los Angeles - and supply water to customers in Beverly Hills and parts of West Hollywood. The project is part of the city's Water Enterprise Plan, created in 2015 with the goal of reducing the city's dependence on imported water from the Metropolitan Water District. The

wells are partially funded by a federal grant secured by Congressman Ted Lieu (D-Los Angeles County).

"These future wells will be about 500 feet in depth ... First they have to drill both locations, then they'll come back ... and put the devices in to pump the water. They would eventually connect that up to our water pipeline, and we'll build housing around the wells to secure them. Ultimately, we're looking at completion in 2026," Beverly Hills Utilities General Manager Robert Welch said.

Drilling has already begun for the LeDoux well, which will be located at the southwest corner of La Cienega Park. The well will be located just outside Frank Fenton Field at the intersection of LeDoux Road and Olympic Boulevard. Frank Fenton Field will remain open for the duration of construction, and sports practices will continue as usual this summer.

"We laid out the work area in coordination with community services to ensure that we had the least impact on the play area," Welch said.

According to Welch, nearby residents and park visitors should expect parking restrictions on

■ Bike lanes and wider sidewalks are planned



Construction on the Access to Hollywood project, which will create pedestrian improvements and bike lanes on Hollywood Boulevard between La Brea Avenue and Lyman Place in East Hollywood, could begin any-

The first phase will begin on the eastern side between Gower Street and Lyman Place. Later phases will be implemented on Hollywood Boulevard between La Brea Avenue and Gower Street.

Trump holds Beverly Hills fundraiser

■ President Joe Biden brings the stars out in DTLA

Former president and recently convicted felon Donald Trump will hold an invitation-only fundraiser at an undisclosed private residence in Beverly Hills on Friday, June 7. The fundraising event - which reportedly costs up to \$250,000 to attend comes shortly after Trump was convicted of 34 counts of falsifying business documents in a hush money trial in New York City on May 30. Trump will be sentenced on July 11, days before the Republican National Convention. Beverly Hills Police Department Lt. Andrew

Myers said that the BHPD is working with "federal partners" for the event, but could not share any details regarding planned safety measures.

"Currently, we are not aware of any planned protests or demonstrations," Myers said on Wednesday, June 5.

Trump will hold similar fundraising events this week across California, with one in San Francisco on Thursday, June 6, and in Newport Beach on Saturday, June 8.

Next weekend, President Joe Biden will hold a fundraising event at the Peacock Theater in Downtown Los Angeles. The event will reportedly feature guests including actors George Clooney and Julia Roberts, and former President Barack

City announces more resources to help small business owners

Los Angeles Mayor Karen Bass announced more resources to support small businesses as part of work to continue opening Los Angeles for business. The two programs include LA Optimized 2.0, which will help small businesses build and strengthen their digital presence, and LApreneur, a new online learning platform created to equip entrepreneurs with key skills and information to succeed.

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"We are continuing to open Los Angeles for business by offering more and new resources to help Angelenos be competitive online and new learning opportunities to help Angelenos deepen their knowledge and hone their business skills," Bass said. "These resources are part of our ongoing work to make sure small businesses can start, grow and thrive in the city and our recommendations are directly informed by what the business community tells

us is needed."

LA Optimized 2.0 is the second iteration of a program by the Economic and Workforce Development Department that seeks to bridge the digital divide and help small businesses access assistance to adapt and compete in the digital marketplace. It helps businesses improve or create websites and social media channels and provides branding support. Up to 500 businesses will receive assistance with website and social media creation and up to 1,000 businesses will be eligible to receive digital evaluation and recommendations to optimize digital presence. The program is made possible through American Rescue Plan Act funds and an earmark appropriation made by U.S. Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA).

LApreneur is a comprehensive, collaborative partnership established by the Mayor's Office of Business and Economic Development, the city's BusinessSource Centers, Loyola Marymount University and other partners to streamline entrepreneurship education and resources for aspiring and existing business owners. The program was developed based on recommendations provided by the Mayor's Small Business Cabinet, whose members shared concerns over gaps in entrepreneurship knowledge communities of color face and the need for the city to connect microbusinesses to existing resources.

The release of new resources follows the fourth installment of the Los Angeles Region Small Business Summit, an ongoing partnership between the city and county of Los Angeles that drew more than 500 small business owners and entrepreneurs. The LA Pride Block Party will continue from noon-8 p.m. between Vine and Gower streets on Hollywood Boulevard and will include performances from The LA Wranglers, the Mariachi band Arcoiris and the Queer/Latinx reggaeton DJ group Preciose Night.

Firefighters extinguish blaze in Larchmont Village home

A fire caused heavy damage to a single-family home on June 1 at 636 N. Lucerne Boulevard, just south of Melrose Avenue in Larchmont Village. The Los Angeles Department of Building and Safety red-tagged the home, deeming it uninhabitable.

Firefighters responded at 9 a.m. and found flames emanating from the rear portion of the residence. Thirty-seven firefighters battled the blaze, which was extinguished in 27 minutes.

"Firefighters determined the fire started outside about six feet away from the structure," LAFD spokesman Nicholas Prange said. "I don't have any indication whether the home was occupied at the time but it appears to have started on the deck and then spread to the structure. The fire damaged one vehicle on the property."

Prange said authorities were unable to pinpoint how the fire started.

"After an investigation, the cause was undetermined," he added. "No injuries were reported.

Suspects sought for Hancock Park robbery

Police are searching for two male suspects who robbed a victim around 5 p.m. on May 30 in the 300 block of Lillian Way. The suspects may be part of a robbery crew targeting victims in the area, police said. The suspects stole the victim's Rolex watch and fled.

The victim, who is female, was sitting alone in the driver's seat of a parked car on the residential street, just north of Rosewood Avenue and a block west of Rossmore Avenue in Hancock Park. Lt. Mark Ro, with Los Angeles Police Department's Wilshire Division, said the victim saw the suspects pass by in a grey SUV that stopped and reversed toward her vehicle. Two suspects jumped out and the driver sped away in the SUV. The assailants stole the victim's watch and were immediately picked up by a second car, Ro added.

"They were not armed but the victim was afraid and very intimidated," Ro said. "She only saw the (213)922-8205. During and off-hours, call the I line at (877)LAPD247.

two suspects, but obviously there were more people involved, which leads me to believe it was a multiple suspect crew. We are not sure if they followed her there or were in the area and saw her."

The suspects were Black men approximately 18-25 years old, Ro said. The second vehicle was described by the victim as a Lexus or Infinity.

Ro said no similar incidents have been reported in the Wilshire area. He cautioned members of the public to be cautious when wearing expensive jewelry because thieves are always looking for opportunities

"My concern here is a couple years ago, we had people getting robbed for their luxury watches. It may be coming back and it's concerning," Ro added.

Art dealer convicted of embezzlement

An art dealer who founded the Ace Gallery, formerly located on Wilshire Boulevard in the Miracle Mile, was found guilty by a jury on May 31 of embezzling more than \$260,000.

Douglas J. Chrismas, 80, a resident of the Mid-Wilshire area, was found guilty of three counts of embezzlement, authorities said. Chrismas was president and CEO of Art and Architecture Books of the 21st Century, which did business as Ace Gallery at 5514 Wilshire Blvd. In 2013, Ace Gallery filed for bankruptcy and Christmas became the estate's acting trustee and custodian.

According to evidence presented at a four-day trial, Ace Gallery con-

tinued to operate while in bankruptcy and Chrismas retained control over the business until April 2016, when a bankruptcy court appointed an independent trustee. Prosecutors said Chrismas embezzled approximately \$264,595 that belonged to the Ace Gallery bankruptcy estate between late March and early April 2016, including a \$50,000 check that Chrismas signed. The check was drawn against the estate and was paid to Ace Museum, a separate nonprofit owned and controlled by Chrismas, authorities said.

United States District Judge Mark C. Scarsi scheduled a Sept. 9 sentencing hearing. Chrismas faces five years in federal prison for each

Pursuit through Hollywood ends with collision

A 35-year-old man who allegedly fired a gun on Franklin Avenue on May 31 was arrested after leading police on a pursuit through Hollywood and crashing into two vehicles at Sunset Boulevard and Vine Street.

Police received a call around 9:30 p.m. about shots fired in the 5600 block of Franklin Avenue. The caller provided a description of the suspect, and officers found the alleged gunman near the shooting scene. The suspect ran from the officers, got in a car and drove away, police said.

Officers followed the suspect on Wilton Place and Hollywood Boulevard but lost sight of the vehicle. Minutes later, another officer saw the vehicle on Sunset Boulevard and began following the car, which crashed into two vehicles at Sunset Boulevard and Vine

Street. The suspect got out and attempted to flee on foot but was apprehended.

The driver of one of the vehicles involved in the collision was hospitalized with non-life-threatening injuries. The other driver did not require transportation to a hospital, police said.

The suspect was identified as Cornell Harvey, of Los Angeles. He sustained a minor head injury in the crash and was treated at a hospital. Harvey was later booked on felony assault charges. The LAPD's Multi-Disciplinary Collision Investigation Team is investigating the crash.

Disabled man reunited with family in Hancock Park

Officers from the Wilshire Division reunited a mentally disabled man with his family after he entered a residence in Hancock Park on June 2 in the 100 block of North Citrus Avenue.

Police were alerted by actor Jonathan Tucker, who lives on the street and saw the man enter his neighbor's home around 6:20 p.m. Lt. Mark Ro, with the Los Angeles Police Department's Wilshire

Division, said officers arrived and found a man in the residence and detained him. He said they could clearly tell the man suffered from a disability. Ro did not have the man's age but said he is an adult. After a short period, officers located his parents and they were reunited.

"His parents dropped him off at a nearby church and at some point, he left the church and started wandering around outside. He ended up entering a residence," Ro said. "He was returned to his parents, who were very cooperative. The man was very cooperative as well."

The incident was reported by the media as a home invasion incident, and reports stated that Tucker went inside and ushered residents out of the house. Ro confirmed officers spoke with Tucker at the scene as well as the homeowner.

"It was definitely not a home invasion," Ro added. "I don't know exactly how everything went down, but based on the circumstances, nobody wanted to press any charges."

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Hollywood building provides affordable housing for artists

Los Angeles has long been a mecca for artists. Aspiring musicians, actors and writers move to the city every year with dreams of one day making it big. But for some, the high cost of living makes it almost impossible to survive off

the limited income from artistic work. With the COVID-19 pandemic and recent SAG-AFTRA and WGA strikes halting film and television productions, many in the entertainment industry have been out of work for months or years.

"We know that in the main entertainment hubs in the country – New

WeHo trans activist Chanel Blac Lumiere nominated as Pride honoree

Each Pride Month, California's Legislative LGBTQ Caucus recognizes important LGBTQ+ residents, nominated by public office holders from around the state. This year, West Hollywood Councilwoman Sepi Shyne is nominating Chanel Blac Lumiere, a Black trans woman who has decades of experience as a teacher and frontline activist. A proclamation will be presented to Lumiere by the City Council at 6 p.m. on June 10.

Lumiere said she works to "create and implement safe spaces for people to show up and be their authentic selves." Among the events Lumiere curates are low-to-no cost themed parties, art shows and educational seminars.

"The typical income [for trans and non-binary individuals] is like \$11,000 a year. So, if the person is making \$11,000 a year and they want to go out, how can they realistically afford that? That's where I come in," Lumiere said. "We create meaningful connections through socializations."

For 20 years, Lumiere served as a preschool teacher, which she said laid the groundwork for creating safe spaces for trans people.

"It was never about the toys that the children have in the classroom," she explained. "It was more about those interactions, meeting them where they are [and] understanding their emotional needs. Asking them, 'What happened? What's going with you? How are you feeling today?' All of those pieces are vital for a child, but they're also vital for an adult that's coming into their identity and their existence."

Lumiere immigrated with her parents from Belize in Central America to the Los Angeles area when she was a child.

"I always loved education and learning and teaching, [so] when I graduated high school, I started working for Los Angeles Unified School District as a teacher assistant," she recalled.

From there she went on to work as a teacher at a private school and later with the community leadership and advocacy program Head Start. While she was still teaching, she became a board member at the Unique Women's Coalition, which helps to empower Black trans and LGBTQ+ individuals through community engagement.

"I decided to walk away from early education because I saw that there was more need in the community, specifically our trans community, just for representation – to speak to the experience – and to also show my trans siblings that you can make it. You can survive despite your identity and what people tell you or try to box you into. I felt like I had to step out on faith and just plunge into something new," Lumiere said.

She is now the resident advisor at a residential property for formerly incarcerated trans women, a volunteer helping unhoused people and an occasional education consultant.

"I do a lot of work on social emotional learning from a trauma informed lens – managing your feelings and emotions in different social circles," Lumiere explained. "I've been homeless ... I'm a cancer survivor ... I'm an immigrant, Black, trans ... I check a lot of boxes, so I think that's one of the reasons why I love hard."

Love starts from within, Lumiere explained, when asked what advice she would give to young, BIPOC trans individuals.

"It starts with you loving on yourself, nonstop, unconditionally, [and] surrounding yourself with people who are going to love you just as you are," she expanded. "Be extremely gentle with yourself and learn that when something is not for you, walk away. And as easy as that may sound, that has worked for me ... It's not easy to be brave, but try your best every day to be brave and just simply be gentle with yourself."

York and Los Angeles in particular – it's very difficult for working artists in all these disciplines to live affordably, but also to live in proximity to where they work," Keith McNutt said.

McNutt is the director of the western region of the The Entertainment Community Fund, a national nonprofit formerly known as The Actors Fund that supports workers across different roles in the entertainment industry.

"The mission is really twofold. Half of what we do is acting as a safety net for people in times of need or crisis, and the other half is helping people build more sustainable lives in the arts over the long term," McNutt said.

On Wednesday, May 29, the Entertainment Community Fund, in partnership with developer Thomas Safran & Associates, officially launched a new residential building in Hollywood that provides affordable housing exclusively for lowincome artists. The 152-unit building is located on a former parking lot at 1630 Schrader Blvd. and is known as the Cicely Tyson Residential Building. The unit prices range from \$600-\$2,400 per month, and the building has community spaces such as shared lounges, a gym, courtyards and a commercial space that will house the future headquarters of the Entertainment Community Fund's West Coast headquarters.

The residential building is half of a two-structure project called the Hollywood Arts Collective. An adjacent building known as the Rita Moreno Arts Building is currently under construction.

"When it's done, it's going to

initiated because of a large donation made by [philanthropist] Glorya Kaufman. It will also have a little over 3,000 square feet of art gallery space for Los Angeles Contemporary Exhibitions," said Courtney DeBeikes, senior project manager at Thomas Safran & Associates.

The Rita Moreno Arts Building is expected to open to the public in fall 2025, according to DeBeikes.

According to McNutt, the project has been in the works since 2006, when Entertainment the Community Fund first approached the city about the need for more affordable housing. After partnering with Thomas Safran & Associates, the nonprofit finally received approval to create affordable housing at the site in Hollywood in 2016. After receiving the lease, the groups applied for financing through federal affordable housing grants. The residential

building cost approximately \$90 million to build.

"Those tax credit allocations are more than half of the cost of construction. We got a grant from the state, a grant from the city and took out some conventional financing and that's where the funding comes [from] to make it affordable," McNutt said.

The Hollywood Arts Collective is located on city-owned land that it leases for \$1 each year. The affordable housing project will move the city closer to its goal of creating over 450,000 housing units by 2029, as planned in its 2021-29 housing element.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony for the building was held on Wednesday, May 29, although residents began moving in in August 2023.

"We generally like to wait a couple of months to let residents get See **Affordable** page 7



From Sunset Sound to Inside Safe

■ Mayor moves people living on Sunset Boulevard indoors

The city of Los Angeles removed an encampment on May 31 that was located for months outside the Sunset Sound Recording Studio at 6650 Sunset Blvd., near the corner of Cherokee Avenue.

The tents were cleared as part of Mayor Karen Bass' Inside Safe Program, which places people in motels and temporary housing until permanent housing is secured. It was the city's 50th Inside Safe operation since the start of 2023 and also included a separate cleanup on Sixth Street near Wilton Place in Windsor Square. Thirtyfive people were moved into housing from the two sites. The operation was a partnership between Bass' office, City Councilman Hugo Soto-Martinez, 13th District, and County Supervisor Lindsey Horvath, 3rd District.

"The Inside Safe operations in Hollywood and near Koreatown continue the work to urgently bring unhoused Angelenos inside and save lives," Bass said. "I want to thank Supervisor Horvath, Councilman Soto-Martinez and our service provider partners for their work to address this crisis head on."

Bass announced the Inside Safe operation in front of Sunset Sound during a Hollywood Chamber of Commerce luncheon on May 28. She visited the site on May 31 during the Inside Safe operation and met with people living there. She said it was one of many encampments in Hollywood where the city and county plan to house people and clear tents in the near future.

Sunset Sound Recording Studio owner Paul Camerata thanked Bass, and said she personally contacted him about addressing the situation. Camarata said people living in the encampment started fires and broke into the studio and stole equipment. He estimates the damage and loss was around \$20,000-\$25,000, which he said was covered by insurance.

"It was definitely a challenging experience operating a business here for the past nine or 10 months. Luckily, we don't have an entrance on Sunset, but they would block our ingress and egress on Cherokee," Camarata said. "I will say that through all of this, the most effective help we have had was the

mayor and her office. She was personally involved. I talked to her on a couple occasions. They had outreach workers coming out every week. It's the cleanest I've seen it in over a year. I am very appreciative of [Bass] and her aides."

Camarata added that the encampment took a toll on business and he had many high profile clients who wondered why the tents were allowed to exist. They included Elton John, who recorded in the studio over a two-month period late last year.

"The production manager was asking, 'what's going on?'," Camerata said. "The homeless situation has certainly concerned a lot of people."

Camarata and some of his neighbors have placed decorative planters with cacti on the sidewalk to prevent tents from returning. The property owners paid for the planters and are working with the city to determine if there will be reimbursement. More planters and barriers will likely be placed in the near future to ensure the site is not re-populated. The city is monitoring the site and will dispatch outreach workers to address any tents that return.

Soto-Martinez said addressing the encampment on Sunset Boulevard was a priority.

"The role that we have to play as council is identifying the encampments that we want to prioritize, because it's incredibly difficult [to address them] with the limited resources that we have. We're always balancing that out and this one became one of the top priorities," Soto-Martinez said. "We were happy to work with the mayor. Our team was out there multiple times a week, coordinating the service providers, making sure people were ready to go in, and as a result, we were able to get 100% of the people there indoors."

"[The] Inside Safe at Sunset Sound demonstrates that we can successfully bring people inside when the county, city and community come together in our shared mission to solve our homelessness crisis," Horvath added. "I'm grateful for the partnership of the Mayor's Office, Councilmember Soto-Martinez, the Sunset Sound team, PATH, LAHSA and the county's Homeless Initiative and Department of Mental Health for their all-hands-on-deck response that our homelessness emergency requires.

Hollywood Chamber of

Commerce representatives said they met with Bass and her staff during the weeks leading up to the Inside Safe operation and praised the mayor for following through.

"We ... have been advocating with the city to prioritize that location for an Inside Safe operation. I've walked through here. It was a very unhealthy location that needed a big intervention."

"[Homelessness] is a really difficult problem to solve, and it's easy to criticize when there aren't instant results. But I am hopeful that things will get better," Hollywood Chamber of Commerce president and CEO Steve Nissen said. "I don't think it's obvious that it's gotten a lot better, but progress has been made. The mayor is very dedicated to seeing Inside Safe and other programs be successful, and is passionate about getting people off the street, so I'm optimistic. I'm not yet ready to say things have gotten a lot

better. I will say certainly this recent action was great and hopefully it is a harbinger of more to come."

Kathleen Rawson, president and CEO of the Hollywood Partnership, which oversees the business improvement district in Hollywood, added that her organization also worked with Bass and Soto-Martinez to address the encampment

"We, for many weeks, have been advocating with the city to prioritize that location for an Inside Safe operation. I've walked through here. It was a very unhealthy location that needed a big intervention," Rawson said. "Inside Safe is not a perfect solution but it's substantially better than letting people languish on the street. It was really great she was able to prioritize that location."

settled and address any construction issues ... before we invite so many people and city officials," DeBeikes said.

All of the units in the building have been filled, and the waitlist to apply for a lease is now approximately 3,000 names long, DeBeikes said. The building is currently only accepting applications for mobility accessible units.

Though the building is full, DeBeikes and McNutt said that plans for similar artist-focused affordable housing projects are in the works.

McNutt said that in addition to Kaufman's donation for the arts building, she also gifted the non-profit funding for future projects.

"She was so happy with how this is all turning out that she said, 'you know what, I want you to be able to

do more.' So she gave us this transformational gift a year and a half ago to build five more of these projects in L.A. County, all affordable housing for artists, over the next 10 years," McNutt said.

In the meantime, McNutt encouraged local artists and entertainment professionals who are interested in similar opportunities to create an account with Entertainment Community Fund's online portal.

"You can look through all of the educational and support services that we have available to the community here. Four times a year, we have affordable housing workshops on how to locate other kinds of affordable housing in the neighborhood." McNutt said.

Council shoots down vacancy tax as WeHo storefronts struggle

It's been two years since the Starbucks on Santa Monica Boulevard and Westmount Drive in West Hollywood closed its doors. Last October, Kitchen 24 – once a staple of the neighborhood abruptly closed. Restaurants have come and gone a few times over in the storefront next to the old Starbucks, but today it, too, is

Across the street, the bustling John Reed Fitness would seem to be harbinger of things to come, but before it launched, Sprouts and The Wing both vacated. Now, the clothing store YMLA - operated by Block Party WeHo owner Larry Block – is closing. Its inventory is being relocated to Block Party, just a short walk down the street. Block told the Beverly Press that another business - yet to be announced will soon occupy the location, but for now it's another empty storefront on a block of West Hollywood that was once thriving.

At the May 20 City Council meeting, a proposed commercial vacancy tax ballot measure that would have imposed a tax on commercial spaces that sit vacant was

shot down, and the council debated the best possible ways to move forward in filling Rainbow District storefronts.

There remains plenty of commerce along Santa Monica Boulevard – Shake Shack, Tail O' the Pup, Rawberri Superfood Café, The Lucky Tiki and the Ramada Inn, among them. But what was once West Hollywood's most social intersection is relatively quiet.

Farther down the street the city's popular bars and restaurants thrive, including The Abbey Food and Bar, Micky's and Tender Greens. Even there, however, the former locations of Flaming Saddles and Pump have yet to be filled with new businesses.

Mayor John Erickson said the blame falls on the landlords.

"Commercial rent is at an alltime high because commercial landlords have not collected rent for the last three years," Erickson said. "The issue is not the minimum wage, it's greedy landlords that are charging exorbitant amounts of

Councilman John Heilman said that while the city needs to find a way to address the vacancies, a tax is not the way forward.

"I've been very vocal about the

need for the City Council to focus on helping our business community and addressing vacancies," Heilman said. "I've raised concerns about several areas which are particularly distressed, but this is an issue impacting many locations in the city. We need to work to restore positive relations with our business community. Taxing property owners who have vacant storefronts won't solve the problem. And in some instances, that tax will simply be passed on to the existing tenants in the property. That doesn't help the business community and it doesn't solve the problem. We should be evaluating how we can encourage more businesses to locate in West Hollywood, rather than spending time on measures that are hostile to the business community."

Councilwoman Chelsea Byers said the city is still navigating business recovery after the pandemic.

"The landscape has transformed post-COVID and given that we are still only a few years out of this situation, we are still learning a lot," Byers said. "I am eager to find solutions that encourage business opportunity and make the best use of our retail space on the boulevard. The vacancy tax is a punitive approach that further hinders a business from becoming successful in this challenging economic climate."

The West Hollywood Chamber of Commerce was also against a

vacancy tax.

"Until research validates the need for it, we find it would be punitive and not the right time to pass on fees when we are struggling to rent and get businesses to remain in operation," Chamber president and CEO Genevieve Morrill said.

Councilwoman Lauren Meister, however, disagreed.

"I am very concerned about the vacancies on our commercial corridors and have been advocating for a commercial vacancy tax for years," Meister said. "Commercial landlords can write off a vacant space, so there's no incentive to fill it if they're not getting the high rents we have been seeing of late. I didn't vote against placing a tax on the ballot, however council majority was opposed to it and the item died."

City staff was directed, though, to come back with information regarding the reasons why many storefronts remain vacant.

Various businesses, including the Ramada Inn and John Reed Fitness, did not respond to a request for comment.

'Meet the Stars' at the Hollywood barn

■ Russ Tamblyn rounds out MGM 100 exhibit

Hollywood Heritage Museum's "Meet the Stars: 100 Years of MGM Studios and the Golden Age of Hollywood" will close Sunday, on June 9. The exhibit covers the first century of one of Hollywood's most storied film factories, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer. MGM was the preeminent film studio of Hollywood's Golden Age, releasing such classic films as "The Wizard of Oz," "Singin' in the Rain" and "Ben-Hur."

"MGM was the best of the Golden Age studios with the biggest stars and films," historian and collector Darin Barnes said. "From Judy Garland to Clark Gable, no other studio could beat

their star power."

On June 8, actor and dancer Russ Tamblyn will appear at the Hollywood Heritage Museum as part of the organization's exhibition. The star will be signing his new memoir, "Dancing on the Edge," and participating in a Q&A session between 1-3 p.m.

"My memoir is in three sections: Hollywood Heydays, Escape to Topanga and Rebirth," Tamblyn related. "I think that these folks will really love the stories in the first part of my book - 'Hollywood Heydays.' Different people will love different stories. For instance, my wife Bonnie loves the stories about my very early days, and what Hollywood as an old movie-town was like. Riding the red cars into the city from the San Fernando Valley, and the wonderfully colorful, unique characters that got me started."

Tamblyn was under contract to

MGM during the 1950s. He appeared in several of the studio's highest grossing movies, including "How the West Was Won" and "Seven Brides for Seven Brothers," where he tumbled his way into America's hearts as Gideon - one of the seven brothers.

There are so many stars from Fred Astaire to Elizabeth Taylor who were all part of the MGM family that I feel honored to have known and to be part of that amazing constellation of stars, and share these stories," Tamblyn said.

His most famous role was likely for a different studio, however -United Artists' Academy Awardwinning production of "West Side Story," where he played Riff. He was also nominated for a Best Supporting Actor Oscar for "Peyton Place." Later in life, he was a main cast member on the cult series "Twin Peaks."

Additionally, the Hollywood Heritage Museum – affectionately known as the barn - will also be host a Judy Garland birthday and Pride celebration to close out 'Meet the Stars' on June 9 from 4-7 p.m. Garland's son Joey Luft will attend. Costumes worn by Garland in "The Wizard of Oz" and "Meet Me in St. Louis," among items, are part of the MGM 100 exhibit.

For many years, MGM was based in Culver City on what is now the Sony Pictures Entertainment lot. Beyond the main studio facility, hundreds of adjoining acres of Culver City were owned by the studio and served as its expansive

"Sadly, the old MGM Studio space is now Columbia-Sony and it's their 100th anniversary," Barnes said. "Warner Bros. owns the rights to the MGM films and Amazon owns the MGM name. It put any sort of celebration in a sad place of limbo. We partnered up with the Culver City Historical Society to celebrate the centennial and have [had] an overwhelming response."

Costumes and memorabilia are also on display from stars like Jean

Harlow, Esther Williams, Lana Turner, Greer Garson, Eleanor Powell, Hedy LaMarr and Ann Miller. The fur coat Luise Rainer wore the night she won the Best Actress Academy Award for the studio's "The Great Ziegfeld" is also on view, as is a hotel-style ledger from the 1932 premiere of "Grand Hotel," filled with the names of the day's biggest and brightest stars.

"More stars than there are in the heaven," Barnes said, repeating MGM's oft-quoted tagline. "[With] mounting these kinds of exhibit, we hope to open the barn to a whole new audience. Partnering up with private collectors, we are able to display pieces that may otherwise never be seen publicly. It's our plan to have quarterly exhibits to keep the excitement and interest going,

He also teased the museum's next show, "Out with the Stars." which will take a look at Los Angeles' historic restaurants and nightclubs, as well as the legendary World War II-era service-member club Hollywood Canteen.



Holocaust Museum L.A. closes for construction

■ Pan Pacific Park exhibitions will reopen Nov. 11

Holocaust Museum L.A. - the city's leading educational institute focused on preserving stories from Holocaust survivors - closed on June 3 for construction that will last through the summer and fall. The museum will reopen on Nov. 11.

The closure will allow for the continued construction of the museum's "Building Truth" expansion project. The \$55-million project includes the new Jona Goldrich Campus, an aboveground addition to the museum's current location underneath Pan Pacific Park.

"The reason why we decided to do the expansion project in the first place is because starting in 2019, we realized we couldn't keep up with the demand from the schools. We got to the point where we started turning school groups away," Holocaust Museum L.A. CEO Beth Kean said. "We were seeing this huge increase in antisemitic incidents and hate incidents, and we realized we don't have adequate space ... we were just at capacity.'

The new campus will include

two structures that will house gallery and exhibition spaces, classrooms and two theaters. The expansion will nearly double the overall floor space of the museum, from 28,000 to 50,000 square feet, and will also include outdoor spaces and gardens.

According to Kean, the new campus will increase the museum's visibility to park visitors.

"We built this gorgeous underground building - subterranean, very organic-looking - built into the landscape of the park. But when people go to the park for a baseball game or a basketball game or just for a family picnic, and you look up, it's not very obvious that there's a Holocaust museum there," she

One of the new outdoor pavilions will feature the harrowing display of a Nazi-era boxcar used to transport Jews to concentration camps in Poland. According to Kean, the majority of the work done this summer and fall will be focused on moving the boxcar into its new location on top of the current museum.

"[The boxcar] has to be airlifted and then put in place and secured on top of the existing building. The pavilion is going to be built around that ... so that's what's going to happen this summer," Kean said.

The museum's current exhibitions must be removed to allow for engineering work that will enhance the structural stability of the existing building, Kean said.

"We can't risk damaging our artifacts. Right now ... we have a whole team with white gloves on removing the artifacts from the cases and putting them into boxes and packing up everything that's on the museum floor," she added.

The expansion project broke ground in November 2023 with a ceremony attended by museum and community leaders. The Jona Goldrich Campus is expected to be completed and open in early 2026, according to Kean.

The museum will continue to host virtual events throughout the closure, including talks with Holocaust survivors and historical lectures. Additionally, the museum

will host in-person events at The Grove, such as book discussions at Barnes & Noble and film screen-

ings at the AMC theater.



Delays with TV City project are frustrating

I am frustrated by the ongoing delay tactics to keep the Hackman group from breaking ground to build a state-of-the-art television studio on the site of a legacy television studio.

It's no secret that Gilmore and Caruso tried to buy the studio to extend The Grove and build highpriced residential buildings on the property. CBS preferred to sell the studio to a company that would keep the historic site as an operational studio. It was fully in their right to choose a preferred buyer of their property.

We have an urgent need to keep production in L.A. and that means we need modern, sustainable studios to compete with those being built in other states. This studio will provide thousands of good paying union jobs with employees who will eat in local restaurants and patronize local businesses. This will enable the stretch of Fairfax north of Beverly to become a vibrant corridor of small businesses. As with all studios, the non-production office space will be rented to industry related businesses writers, managers, small production companies - not to dentists or plumbing supply companies.

Every move to block this development is hurting the local economy and the overall industry. And for what?

Opponents raise concerns about traffic and trucks. The flyer that came through my mail slot admitted that this opposing group was started and funded by Gilmore and Caruso. Yet, there is no mention of the traffic and trucks that keep The Grove – and Erewhon – in business. So, in opposing a redeveloped television studio, those who support Gilmore and Caruso will still get traffic and trucks because luxury goods and organic groceries don't grow on the shelf. They are delivered.

Hackman proposes a construction timeline that will have the studio completed and operational in less than three years. By that time,

the subway station at Wilshire and Fairfax will be running and will eliminate a lot of cars entering the area. History has shown that the entire area around subway stations will be redeveloped and this is a good thing. As a 43-year resident of this neighborhood, I welcome a modern, sustainable studio.

Whom Should I Name As My **Executor or** Trustee?

he executor of your will and the trustee of your revocable (aka living trust) serve almost identical functions after your death, in the short run. Although your executor is generally subject to direct court supervision, both the executor and the trustee have similar fiduciary responsibilities. The trustee may assume responsibilities under your trust while you are living. Although you may act as initial trustee if you become incapacitated, the designated successor trustee may then step in to manage your assets for your benefit.

An executor or trustee may be a spouse or other relative, family friend, business associate or a professional fiduciary such as a bank. There are a number of issues to consider in determining who to name as an executor or trustee

While both are responsible for ensuring that your wishes are implemented, when your will or trust establishes provisions for the long term management of funds, your choice for executor or trustee should also be based on a similarity, or at a minimum, an understanding of your lifestyle choices as there may be many "discretionary" decisions that your executor or trustee will make. Other issues to be considered would be whether or not the appointment of one of your adult children could cause undue stress in his or her relations with siblings. What conflicts of interest are created if a business associate or partner is named as your executor or trustee? Will the person named as executor or successor trustee have the time, organizational ability and experience to do the job effectively?

You should discuss your choice with your estate planning lawyer, your accountant and other financial advisors.

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Subway work requires traffic lane reductions

Metro is working at multiple Extension project and is cautioning about disruptions to motorists. Lane closures are in place around the subway stations at Wilshire/La Brea, Wilshire/Fairfax, Wilshire/La Cienega, Wilshire/Rodeo and Century City/Constellation.

At the eastern end of the project work zone is located in the middle restoration work is ongoing through August. Detroit Street is intermittently closed at Wilshire Boulevard from 7 a.m.-3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday; and 6 a.m.-7 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday.

In the Miracle Mile, a K-rail

locations along the D Line Subway near Wilshire/La Brea, street of Wilshire Boulevard between Courtyard Place and Masselin Avenue through September.

At the Wilshire/Fairfax station, crews are working underground and at street level within K-rail work zones. Northbound Orange Grove Avenue is closed at Wilshire Boulevard through July 1. Southbound traffic from Wilshire Boulevard to Eighth Street is maintained. Wilshire Boulevard is reduced to two lanes in each direction at La Jolla Avenue.

Beginning in June, a K-rail work zone may be implemented on northbound La Cienega Boulevard just north of Wilshire Boulevard and the La Cienega staging yard. A K-rail work zone remains in place on the north side of Wilshire Boulevard between San Vicente and La Cienega boulevards. Right turns from southbound San Vicente Boulevard to westbound Wilshire Boulevard may be intermittently restricted through June 9 from 3 a.m.-6 p.m. on weekdays, and 4

a.m.-10 p.m. on weekends. Eastbound Wilshire Boulevard may be intermittently reduced to a single lane between Le Doux Road and Hamilton Drive through June 9 from 8 p.m.-7 a.m. on weeknights, and from 6 a.m.-10 p.m. on weekends.

At the Wilshire/Rodeo station, crews are working on South Beverly and Cañon drives through June. Construction is ongoing for underground appendage structures, which are rooms and passageways adjacent to the station. Deliveries of material, equipment and concrete continue daily to the station.

the Century City/Constellation station utility work is progressing in June. Constellation Boulevard is intermittently closed from 8 p.m.-6 a.m. for the placement of structural concrete. Portions of Avenue of the Stars are closed through the end of June to accommodate storm drain and utility relocation.

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Prima Donna brings Sicilian 'festa' to Culver City


Nestled behind the swanky lobby of the Shay Hotel in Culver City is a lively destination for any fan of Italian food, or even those just looking for a fun night out. Prima Donna has everything — a woodfired oven, creative cocktails, even a DJ — and it combines comforting Sicilian staples with an upbeat atmosphere that is sure to satisfy anyone hungry for a good time.

The dining room finds a balance between being spacious and comfortable - the exposed brick, dim lighting and minimalistic décor are effortlessly cool without being pretentious. But the atmosphere really comes to life when the place is packed, and Prima Donna becomes a party – or more fittingly, a "festa." If you like the kind of restaurant where you can find a buzzing ambience without sacrificing reliable service, Prima Donna is the spot for you. On the Friday night that I visited, nearly every table was occupied, but our server was still attentive and the food arrived without delay.

Just like the big and bustling atmosphere, the portions are generous and meant to be shared. I started with the cheesy garlic focaccia, a whopping loaf of crunchy delight. It's massive — protruding well beyond the ornate Sicilian dinner plate. Imagine the most comfortable pillow you've ever laid your head on — light and fluffy to the touch but with just enough firmness when you sink into it. Now imagine it's made of bread, cheese and served with a side of fresh pomodoro sauce.

The appetizers continued with a glimpse of Prima Donna's woodfired oven. Crispy jumbo prawns are served head-on and split down the middle. These shellfish are not for the faint of heart. Separating their succulent tail meat from the shells might get your fingers messy, but it's well worth the reward. If you're a truly adventurous eater do yourself a favor and suck all of the juices from the prawn's head. (Being from South Louisiana, I'm very familiar with the anatomy of any given crustacean, and I'm happy to point you towards the tastiest – and often discarded – organs.)

Finally, the main course consisted of a hulking half-rack of lamb, stacked atop a heaping pile of warm escarole – a leafy green used in homestyle Italian classics. The rack is sliced into individual chops that are perfect for picking up by the bone. I'm not ashamed to say I nearly finished the lamb chops before I even noticed that they came with a side of tomato pesto



and chimichurri sauces, which are excellent accompaniments. The lamb is that good on its own, and any meat lover is sure to enjoy. Just please don't ruin this tender treat by ordering it at any temperature higher than medium rare.

I had never tried escarole before – it's something you don't see often on menus, even at so-called "Italian" restaurants. But this powerful green really packs a punch. It's crunchy, leafy, slightly bitter and reminiscent of collard greens. So for my Southern and soul foodshaped palate, it was a comforting reminder of home.

Michael Santoro, former executive chef at the Beverly Hills Hotel, has done an excellent job bringing Sicilian fare into a fun-loving L.A. setting at Prima Donna. But the fun doesn't end with the dinner menu. Prima Donna's cocktails are a great example of thinking outside the box when it comes to pairing eating and

drinking. Yes, you can find some Italian classics like a riff on an Aperol spritz. But their cocktail menu also features ingredients you might not expect at an Italian restaurant – tequila, mezcal, yuzu liqueur. The "Lucia Mia" is essentially a hibiscus margarita, and it offers the perfect sip for when you need a break from dissecting prawns. Likewise, the "Roma Paloma" is a unique Italianization of the Paloma – a refreshing mezcal drink, this time with extra bitterness from Campari and sweet Italian vermouth.

When you go to Prima Donna, be hungry. Very hungry. And bring friends. You won't regret it.





LAUSD Board approves funding for local school upgrades

The Los Angeles Unified School District Board of Education approved more than \$506 million in bond-funded projects on June 4 to provide upgraded, state-of-the-art facilities.

"These are critical and necessary bond-funded projects," LAUSD Superintendent Alberto M. Carvalho said. "But there is more to be done. If we are seeking to be the premier urban school district in the nation, then our campuses and facilities need to be updated to foster an educational environment capable of addressing current academic challenges."

The board approved \$402.6 million to replace portable buildings with new permanent classroom buildings at Third Street Elementary

School, Bell High School, Leo Politi Elementary School and Limerick Elementary School. Additional campus upgrades include greening improvements to outdoor spaces, Americans with Disabilities Act accessibility improvements and exterior painting of existing buildings.

Over \$64 million was approved to upgrade classrooms at Bancroft Middle School, Adams Middle School, Audubon Middle School, Burbank Arts Tech Community Magnet Middle School, Fleming Middle School, Hale Charter Academy Middle School, Louis Armstrong Middle School and Daniel Webster Middle School. Existing classrooms will be transformed with new technology, flexible classroom furniture, white boards and tack boards, ceiling tiles and window blinds, interior paint and ADA accessibility improvements.

The board approved \$31.4 million for ADA accessibility improvements at Hollywood High School. Haskell Elementary STEAM Magnet, Parthenia Academy of Arts and Technology, Perez Special Education Center, Willenberg Special Education Center and Lowman Special Education and Career Transition Center. The improvements will ensure a barrierfree learning environment for students, staff and community.

"As we continue investing in modernized learning environments, increased green space and critical improvements on all our campuses, I'm proud to direct more funding to build a better future, including over \$100 million invested in my district at Bancroft Middle School, Broadway Elementary, Cowan



This not that: 'Garfield' vs. 'Jim Henson: Idea Man'

Sometimes options abound, but there can be only one

'The Garfield Movie'

Safe bet: Expect anything "Garfield" to disappoint. Those live-action flicks even voice actor Bill Murray dragged, an insufferable Cartoon Network series and now this mediocre animated feature. It should be an easy win, like 2015's "Peanuts Movie," but apparently nothing from Jim Davies' original comic strip would work. At least the kids will likely find it distracting for 101 minutes.

What do you really know about Garfield (voiced here by Chris Pratt)? He lounges around all day with loyal beagle Odie (Harvey Guillén), while spending his owner Jon's dough on drone deliveries of lasagna. Half the fun of this snarky tabby cat is his indifference, his sarcastic quips to a more energetic world surrounding him.

"Garfield" blows through all that in an early montage before completely flipping off the original premise. What do we get instead? A heist story that forces Garfield to reunite with the father (Sam Jackson) who abandoned him as a kitten.

How often do so many familiar faces lend their vocal talents to something this blah: Hannah Waddingham a villainous Persian cat, Ving Rhames as a bull and another "Ted Lasso" alum Brett Goldstein as a very flappy Shar Pei. They all do what they can with very little, while Pratt's vocal talents prove once more that A-list talent might get you the job but little else.

Pratt has his moments as "Parks and Rec's" lovable Andy and the pop culture savvy Star-Lord. But he's no Mario, and he has no business touching Garfield. It's all Pratt being Pratt. Everyone knows this is a paycheck, another prospect that might turn out to be written by AI.

So caring about how Garfield is adapted might be an exercise in madness. Unless, you know, all films should stride for quality. No, that's too wild.

'Jim Henson: Idea Man'

How often do the great die young? By 53, Jim Henson accomplished so much: "Sesame Street,"
"The Muppets," "Labyrinth" and
"The Dark Crystal," along with indirect influence on "Star Wars" and other franchises. And then he was gone, leaving behind a vast creative empire that continues today.

"Jim Henson: Idea Man" is a love letter to a visionary whose iconic characters mold young minds. And in the hands of director Ron Howard, what results is something both honest and emotional.

What most will notice early on: Henson's voice is eerily similar to his most popular Muppet. That shouldn't be shocking. Plenty of creatures do it. But Kermit the Frog is synonymous with so many folks' childhoods. Arguably most people don't know what Henson looks like, let alone how much he sounds like Kermie.

And "Idea Man" doesn't veer far away from Henson, who serves as the primary figure on screen. Howard locates hours and hours of archived footage, from old interviews to behind-the-scenes demos of puppeteering. The level of reach is impressive: each audio track, piece of B-roll and family photo scanned and processed for hi-def screening all add to a marvelous experience that only knows one outcome: nostalgic exploration.

This is an inspirational doc akin to "Life Itself" and "The Devil and Daniel Johnston." It doesn't pull away from the challenging aspects of Henson's personal life. Neither does "Jim Henson: Idea Man" undersell how remarkable its subject was and continues to be through his timeless contribu-

MIMA is an ongoing exhibition series of moving image media artworks on multiple digital billboards at various locations along Sunset Boulevard in West Hollywood. The goals of the MIMA program are to foster cultural equity, expand accessibility, inspire conversation and enhance the human experience of the Sunset Strip. The Invisible Frame billboard, located at 8743 Sunset Boulevard displays artwork that addresses issues of transparency, inclusion, perspective and illu-

The artwork "K-Cosmosis" explores the blended nature of cosmologies within Korean mythology and metaphysics. Informed by feminist and queer philosophies, the artist invites viewers to see the world through osmosis rather than duality to reveal profound connections.

Bomi Yook is a Korean Canadian artist working in computer-generated immersive media, experimental animation and video performance.

The historically significant building that sits at the base of the

Streamlined Arbor billboard at 9157 Sunset Blvd. inspires artwork as an authentic reexamination of cultural identity, by amplifying the voices of those silenced and marginalized.

Since the beginning of the moving image, women over 65 have been the punchline or invisible in contemporary media. However, the artist, niceaunties, portrays older women with fond respect and reverence. They believe (based on the 11 aunties they grew up with) that aunties should be celebrated as valuable witnesses to history. The artist understands that those who disregard the past are condemned to repeat it.

Based out of Singapore, niceaunties is an artist and designer who works in new media and architectural spaces and holds a BA in Architecture from National



Mural illustrates importance of immigrant stories in history of L.A.

The exhibition "East Los Streetscapers: Hacia al Norte" is on display through the end of July in the Getty Gallery at Central Library, 630 W. Fifth St., downtown. It marks the first time the mural has been displayed in a public venue.

Inspired by the Chicano Mural Movement, David Botello and Wayne Healy, who remain core members, founded the East Los Streetscapers (originally called Los Dos Streetscapers) in 1975. Together, they painted some of the first works of the Chicano Mural Movement. During nearly 50 years of painting murals in Los Angeles and across the country, the East Los Streetscapers invited many other artists to join them on mural projects.

Los Angeles painter Rich Raya joined Botello and Healy for "Hacia Al Norte." The muralists often integrate elements of history into their work, showing how the Los Angeles community has been shaped by events near and far, bridging cultures and traditions

This exhibition celebrates

immigrant stories that are central to the history of Los Angeles," Central Library Director Kren Malone said. "The vibrant scenes in the mural are rooted in travel, movement, exploration and human connection. Making this 'Hacia el Norte' exhibition available to students and anyone visiting Central Library serves the library's goal to educate and inspire current and future generations."

"As a community hub, we are thrilled that the library serves as a center for Los Angeles-centric exhibitions as well as for a wealth of other events," Valerie Lynne Shaw, president of the Board of Library Commissioners, said. 

Getty acquires Peter MacGill archive

The Getty Research Institute has acquired the archive of American gallerist, curator and historian Peter MacGill.

MacGill created a standard of fine art photography, providing artists the highest level of representation and establishing Pace/ MacGill Gallery as a preeminent venue dealing in modern and contemporary photography. After working at LIGHT Gallery beginning in 1973, and eventually becoming its director, and at the Center for Creative Photography in Tucson, Arizona, soon after it opened in 1976, MacGill opened Pace/MacGill Gallery in 1983. The gallery was a partnership among MacGill, Arne Glimcher of Pace Gallery and Richard Solomon of Pace Prints. At Pace/MacGill Gallery, MacGill exhibited the work of celebrated photographers, showcased emerging artists, and reached back into history to elevate forgotten visionaries, mounting more than 500 exhibitions, and publishing exhibition catalogues during his 50 years in the field.

Standing out among his many relations in cultivating important private collectors, MacGill negotiated the acquisition of Thomas Walther's collection of early-20th-century European modernism by MoMA, and Manfred Heiting's exceptional survey collection by the

Museum of Fine Arts Houston. As corporate collectors began to acquire fine art photographs, and private collectors sought out select work, MacGill worked with other experts to develop appropriate standards for materials analysis, provenance and exhibition history, all to further a deeper understanding of the photographs the Gallery handled.

The MacGill archive includes records of daily interactions in calendars and call lists, includes business transactions and documents exhibition installations, client correspondence, press releases and clippings, as well as snapshots from MacGill's time in the field. It details how the gallery was positioned to provide artists and collectors with a full range of services from authentication of works of art, authoritative appraisals, to intellectual property and outside legal advice.

Peter and Susan MacGill have a long-standing and important relationship with the Getty, both with the Department of Photographs at the J. Paul Getty Museum, and now at the GRI with this archive which chronicles an era in the history of photography, touching each facet of the story.

This archive will be cataloged over several years, after which time it will be made available at the Getty Research Institute for study. For information, visit getty.edu.



their LGBTQ residents that they are less equal rather than fully equal during Pride Month," Erickson said. "Pride needs to be seen loud and proud everywhere."

"I'm ecstatic that the county is choosing to take a stance, not only a strong stance for our LGBTQ community, but doing it in a way that is present to every, person that is under our rainbow," West Hollywood City Councilwoman Sepi Shyne said.

On June 4, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors raised the Progress Pride flag over the Kenneth Hahn Hall of Administration, with each supervisor noting the flag's importance.

"[There is] this notion that sometimes people perceive flag raising is not enough," L.A. County Supervisor Holly Mitchell, 2nd District, said. "That's not true. Flags are hugely symbolic. We put American flags on the graves of our servicemen and women, we salute our flag at the top of every board meeting. There are Confederate flags that fly over statehouses in the South that carry deep, deep meaning on the negative. [Conversely] this new flag, the progressive flag that has been changed as we have grown and expanded our understanding to include the pink, the blue, the brown and the black, is not only hugely symbolic, but it really is a beacon. It lets people know, 'We see you and there's acceptance.'

"Raising the Progress Pride flag is not only a moment of celebration, [but] unfortunately, in some cases, it is an act of defiance," L.A. County Board of Supervisors Chair Lindsey Horvath, 3rd District, said. "But most importantly, it is a commitment to inclusivity to visibility to belonging, and to uplifting all people.'

The flag is also flying over Los Angeles City Hall for the first time ever this month.

"I'm proud to have signed this historic motion to fly the pride flag over City Hall," Mayor Karen Bass said. "Our message to the rest of the country and to the world is clear - now more than ever, we must stand together. I want to thank Councilman Tim

In addition to the concert, the city recently painted two of its crosswalks rainbow colors to celebrate Pride Month. According to Beverly Hills Transportation Planner Jessie Holzer Carpenter, the project honors the LGBTQ+ community while doubling as a study on pedestrian

"This is an opportunity to test materials and determine if decorative crosswalks can increase drivers yielding to pedestrians and stop sign compliance and thus be expanded to other locations in the city," Holzer Carpenter said. "And second, by specifically installing rainbow decorative crosswalks, the city is using the installation to expand our National Pride Month programming to show our agency's support for our LGBTQ+ residents and stakeholders.'

The decorative crosswalks are located outside City Hall on Rexford Drive and at the intersection of Civic Center Drive and West Third Street.

"Both of these test locations are prominent places in the Civic Center area that we've noticed have high volumes of pedestrian traffic including residents, employees and tourists - and they both have a history of driver noncompliance in yielding to pedestrians," Holzer Carpenter said.

To complete the study, the city will interview pedestrians who used the crosswalks and compare video footage of stop sign compliance before and after the crosswalks were installed. The crosswalk colors will be removed in July, and the city will analyze the results of the study and determine next steps. Holzer Carpenter said the city has not yet determined if the decorative crosswalks will be installed permanently or return for next year's Pride Month.

CHLA volunteers join community health projects

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit in 2020, Judy Koempel, a nurse anesthetist at Children's Hospital Los Angeles, began looking inward.

"I thought, 'I need to find more purpose in my life," she said. "I wanted to feel that I was sharing and helping others - not just my immediate family and friends."

Koempel signed on for the hospilaunched then-newly Community Impact Champions Network. In the four years since, the powerful volunteer network has grown to 1,042 registered team members - including employees, faculty and contract workers from nearly 250 departments, divisions and programs across CHLA.

"Many of our team members want to go above and beyond the work they do at the hospital and take that commitment into the community," project manager Olga Taylor said. "Volunteering is a way of filling your cup - it brings joy to the giver."

At CHLA, "above and beyond" means putting serious human power behind the hospital's longstanding commitment to good neighbor initiatives that promote community wellness and healthy environments. Many of the community projects take place nearby the hospital's Sunset campus in East Hollywood.

The call to serve drew Koempel

to volunteer with a time-honored community nonprofit that shares CHLA's dedication to improving food access – Project Angel Food. "You can always find excuses not to volunteer," says Koempel, "but I realized all I had to do is show up."

Since its beginnings 35 years ago, Project Angel Food has served at least 17 million meals. Each menu item is guided by 13 different medically tailored meal plans. Prior to the pandemic, Project Angel Food in Hollywood served 1,300 meals daily. With COVID-19 and other factors, it ramped up to serving 2,600 clients daily.

Improving food access is a priority focus for the CICN, which also provides volunteers for free produce distributions, in partnership with the East Hollywood Neighborhood Council and Rick's Produce, along with supporting other food giveaways, such as holiday turkeys and hot meals from groups like the Boys & Girls Club.

idea. This is the kind of vision that I think we need in the city," said City Councilman Hugo Soto-Martinez, 13th District. "We have this major international corridor and destination. This will connect ... Los Feliz with Thai Town and Hollywood. People will be able to move around those three areas in a very easy way and in a much safer way."

The project will include protected bike lanes, dedicated bus lanes and expanded space on sidewalks. In some segments, there will be a joint bus and bike lane. New landscaping, street furnishings and fixtures are included, as well as new crosswalks with flashing beacons that stop traffic when activated by pedestrians at Hollywood Boulevard and Rodney Drive, and Hollywood Boulevards.

The project is being funded by \$8 million from Metro's Active Transportation Program and the LADOT's Vision Zero Program. Soto-Martinez said the segment between Gower Street and Lyman

Place will be complete by the end of the summer. The overall project is anticipated to finish during the first part of next year.

Local business leaders are also enthusiastic about the Access to Hollywood project.

"Hollywood Boulevard should be one of the most beautiful, creative and innovative streets in the world. People all around the world have high expectations, and there are expectations that we should work hard in Los Angeles to meet those expectations," Hollywood Chamber of Commerce president and CEO Steve Nissen said. "The Access to Hollywood project and the first phase of it is a great start, but it's only a start. We all need to be committed to ensure that we get to the next phase of the effort because it will benefit not only businesses, but the people who live here."

"Hollywood Boulevard hasn't had any major infrastructure enhancements in decades," said Kathleen Rawson, president and CEO of the Hollywood Partnership, which oversees the business improvement district in the Hollywood Entertainment District. "It's absolutely imperative this area gets a little love. We are very excited about the project. We think it's a great start and a positive step forward."

Some of the infrastructure improvements in the Access to Hollywood project were part of the Heart of Hollywood project conceived under former Councilman Mitch O'Farrell, and the name was changed to "Access to Hollywood" after Soto-Martinez took office. Although the name is similar to "Access Hollywood," a television show linked to a scandal involving Donald Trump during his 2016 election campaign, Soto-Martinez said the new name illustrates what the project strives to accomplish.

"You've got to kick around a nice name that catches people's imagination, and we thought this one was kind of interesting and it caught

people's attention," Soto-Martinez said. "And it also accomplishes what we want, having access to Hollywood."

Nissen said the work is part of an overall effort to make Hollywood more hospitable to residents and

visitors.

"We owe it to the residents, we owe it to tourists and to businesses in the city to make Hollywood Boulevard a great street," he added. "This marks the start of many good things to come."

City drills new water wells in La Cienega Park

LeDoux Road near the construction site. Sidewalks are also closed on the east side of LeDoux.

The Gregory well will be located at the edge of the park near the intersection of Gregory Way and Gale Drive. Drilling at the Gregory well is expected to begin after July 4, according to Welch. Additionally, residents should expect similar parking restrictions and a sidewalk closure on the south side of Gregory Way when construction begins.

The two wells will cost approximately \$6 million to construct, according to Welch.

"The good news is, the city did apply for a grant and we were awarded just under \$1 million for these water wells," Welch said.

The federal grant was secured by Lieu in March. The grant is a part of the fiscal year 2024 appropriations bill signed into law by President Joe Biden on March 9. "As our community continues to feel the impact of the climate crisis, it is essential to guarantee safe drinking water for American families," Lieu said in March. "I came to Congress to fight against climate change on both the local and federal levels. I'm pleased to secure nearly \$1 million in funding to mitigate drinking water shortages and address the long-term resiliency of our community."

Lieu announced on June 5 that he submitted requests for similar funding for the 2025 fiscal year appropriations bill. One of the requests included a \$2 million grant to replace water main pipelines that serve Beverly Hills and parts of West Hollywood. The House Appropriations Subcommittees will now consider the requests for inclusion in the 2025 spending bill.

"Pollinators play a vitally important role in our ecosystem," LADWP Chief Operating Officer Aram Benyamin said. "I am pleased to join in the opening of a new and exciting feature of this historic facility that will bring enjoyment and provide an educational benefit to our visitors. Montañez was a former mayor of San Fernando, member of the San Fernando City Council, assemblywoman representing California's 39th District and assistant general manager of LADWP. 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LADWP awarded federal funding

The Los Angeles Department of Water and Power is among three recipients to receive federal funding from the Bureau of Reclamation to advance sustainable water projects. LADWP was awarded \$30 million for the Los Angeles Groundwater Replenishment Project, one of multiple projects expected to dramatically reduce Los Angeles' dependence on purchased, imported water.

The announcement was made at a press conference held at the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California's Grace F. Napolitano Pure Water Southern California Innovation Center in Carson. LADWP's CEO and chief engineer, Janisse Quiñones was joined by Commissioner Touton of the Bureau of Reclamation, Senator Alex Padilla, U.S. Representatives Grace Napolitano and Nanette Barragan, state and local water offi-

cials, MWD and other water agencies that were also awarded federal funds.

"We are grateful that LADWP was chosen as one of the recipients of this grant, as it will be crucial in helping advance our continued mission to ensure all of our customers have equal access to clean, reliable water," Quiñones said. "Securing this grant is a significant milestone and it wouldn't have been possible without the support from our federal, state and local partners."

In partnership with the Los Angeles Department of Public Works, Bureau of Sanitation and Environment, the \$750 million project will recycle 100% of available wastewater from LASAN's Donald C. Tillman Water Reclamation Plant to produce up to nearly 7 billion gallons per year of purified recycled water for groudwater replacement. For information, visit ladwp.com.


